Ngataranga Bay Dispute TV footage

Funds from a Rotary grant have been used to secure television footage of the Ngataranga Bay dispute.

Rod spent some time at the TV Archive in Wellington and found all of the off cuts and a couple of feature items on the dispute.

Further funds from the Rotary Grant are available for General Displays.

Recent Acquisitions/Donations

- Crimean grave marker and a child's shoe. Found under a house in King Edward parade.

The marker is one of a number found in this area and was part of ballast dumped on what was the old ballast dumping area back in the late 1800's. It is thought they were part of the ballast taken on board the ship that brought the steel sections out for the Calliope Dock. It went through Istanbul/Constantinople. It is thought to have

originated from the old Crimea grave yard.

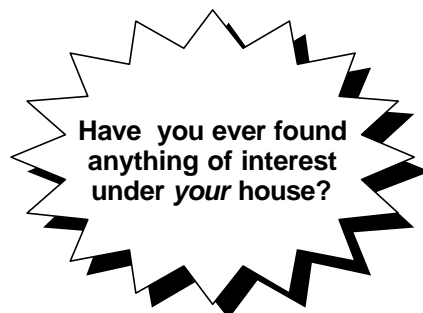
- Two tickets from the horse drawn tram that ran from Devonport to Cheltenham.
